Message from the Artistic Director:

I am a choreographer today because of Young Lungs Dance Exchange. Twenty years ago this organization created a platform for dance makers like myself to create new work with peers, as well as foster an open and encouraging environment for collaboration with all art makers. I was thrilled at the opportunity to step into this position a year ago and offer back the abundance I have received.

Editing the book we created as part of our 20th Anniversary reminded me of the ground breaking work we were making and the conventions we were defying. Whenever I felt discouraged, my forever-mentor Tedd Robinson would remind me to focus on the work of collectives and organizations like Young Lungs Dance Exchange.

D-Anne Kuby is of Slavic and Anglo Saxon descent. She has been working in dance since the late 70's. Performer, teacher, choreographer, rehearsal director, producer/administrator. In the mid 90's she took a step away from performing to study film at Simon Fraser University. She quickly became much sought after for video work in the Vancouver dance community. In 2005 D-Anne felt the pull of the prairies and headed to Regina as manager of New Dance Horizons. Full time admin led to burn out. In 2008 she moved back to Winnipeg. To rest. She slowly reconnected with performance working with artists including, but not limited to Doug Melnyk, Maggie Nagle, lan Mozazen and Zorya Arrow.

YLDE has been instrumental in fanning the flame of her passion for movement. D-Anne combines her movement practice with "just sitting" as they both pull her into her body, the root of her existence.

Jaime Black-Morsette is a Red River Metis artist and activist, with family scrip signed in the community of St Andrews, Manitoba. Jaime lives and works on her home territory near the confluence of the Red and Assiniboine rivers. Founder of The REDress project in 2009, Black-Morsette has been using their art practice as a way to gather community and create action and change around the epidemic of violence against Indigenous women and girls across Turtle Island for over a decade. Black-Morsette's interdisciplinary art practice includes immersive film and video, installation art, photography and performance art practices. Her work explores themes of memory, identity, place and resistance.

JANELLE HACAULT



Janelle Hacault is a Filipinx/French Canadian professional contemporary dance artist, choreographer, teacher, trained singer and actor, and embodiment coach based in Tiohtià:ke/Montréal. Janelle has performed onstage in Annie: la comédie musicale (Just for Laughs) and Rhapsodie (Sylvain Émard Danse/DanseDanse), on film (Virginie Brunelle, Angèle Dubeau, Céline Dion, Trip the Light Fantastic), and on television (Chanteurs Masqués, Révolution season 3). She loves to work in circus with Les 7 Doigts de la Main with director, Gypsy Snider and was principal female dancer for the inaugural cast of Ships in the Night. Last year, she spent 8 months dancing in works by Tony award winning director, Sam Pinkleton and choreographer, Ani Taj onboard Virgin Voyages. Janelle has created several contemporary works of her own and has also choreographed for musical productions, such as Mamma Mia, Grease, Chicago, and an original musical Ships with in collaboration with actor/musician, Jeremy Walmsley. Proud to be a Manitoban, Janelle graduated from the School of Contemporary Dancers, holds a BA Honours in dance and a BA in theatre: performance, and was co-founder of Nova Dance Collective, 6 Ricochet, and thedancepost.org.

Kapwa

"Kapwa" is part dance, part storytelling, part standup comedy. Or it may be all of those things completely. It weaves through personal experiences and childhood memories that center around (mistaken) identity, belonging, and what it means for me to be brown.

Kapwa is a core value of Filipino psychology. It is, "... a recognition of a shared identity, an inner self, shared with others... such inclusiveness is the moral obligation to treat one another as equal fellow human beings." - Professor Virgilio Enriquez, founder of Sikolohiyang Pilipino.

JANELLE HACAULT

Collaborators:

David Bernstein is a dramaturg, writer, director, designer and teacher based in Tiohtià:ke/Montréal. His work has been presented at Teater Momentum in Odense, Denmark: Ars Nova, the New Ohio Theater, The Public Theater, Judson Church, and Dixon Place in New York, USA; and the Theatre Centre, Citadel Theatre, and the plumb in Toronto, Canada: among other venues. He has collaborated with Torontobased choreographer Alyssa Martin, and her company Rock Bottom Movement, on eight works since 2016. Their recent collaboration. Sex Dalmatian, for which he co-wrote the script, was the recipient of three Dora Mavor Moore Awards, including Outstanding Production: Dance Division. He has been a guest teaching artist at Toronto Dance Theatre, York University, and Toronto Metropolitan University in Toronto; the Danish National Performance School in Copenhagen; and Burntwood School in London, UK. His work for radio has been commissioned by Museet for Samtidskunst in Roskilde, Denmark, and published in the Ny nordisk radiodramatik 2019/2020 anthology by Akt1 in Copenhagen, Denmark. He is currently collaborating on La Tresse's upcoming evening-length dance work MIEL, to be presented in Montréal in 2026.

Catherine Beauchemin is many things, but artistically, we aren't ready for this jelly. Cath is an actor, seen on TV, films, and on stage. Not only that, Cath is also a human pole dancing machine and a mindfully enthusiastic coach. ORIAH WIERSMA



Oriah Wiersma is a multidisciplinary dance artist and actor based in Tkaronto. With a BFA in Performance from York University, Oriah's practice spans dance, circus, music, film, and writing. Her creative process is rooted in embodiment and somatic awareness. Described as "highly visceral" and "beautifully haunting" her work explores the dissonant beauty of the human condition.

Oriah thrives in collaborative, interdisciplinary environments, often orbiting closely with musicians and fellow artists. Some of her choreographic/stage work includes: the national tour of her solo isn't this where, The Spirit Garden, R. Murray Schafer's epic outdoor musical drama, interpreting for various choreographers, and performing live alongside bands in bars, festivals, and community parks. On screen Oriah has appeared in various national commercials and music videos: Gone Baby Gone (Aysanabee), Always a Romantic (ZINNIA), Life (Shannon O'Donovan), and Once I Knew (Ptarmigan).

Alongside her performance practice, Oriah is a trained Cranial Sacral Therapist, a path rooted in her dedication to community care. Her current research explores the nervous system, states of attention, and the fluid relationship between body, stimulus, and sensation. This work, paralleled in her art, reflects a deep curiosity of the interplay between inner and outer landscapes

KRYSTINA DEJEAN (MYSTIQUE)



Krystina Dejean (Mystique) is a dancer who specializes in improvised street dance and club styles (waacking, hustle, hiphop). She is currently developing her choreographic approach, greatly influenced by her research into empathy, through research residencies and presenting work in progress pieces in cabaret style evenings. She continues to nurture her work as a performer, touching on the artistic forms of theater and acting on camera. Most recently she was part of the cast of Sportriarcat, a feminist, multidisciplinary play (Claire Renaud, 2023).

Concurrently, as a cultural worker, she collaborates with established local companies and non-profit organizations in various capacities, notably as production coordinator (Montréal Danse, 2022) and assistant artistic and general director (Studio 303, 2023-2024). She maintains her commitment to her community by producing battles (C'est Ma Toune, circa 2021) and events that gather and connect the Tiohtià:ke / Montréal street dance community.

KRYSTINA DEJEAN (MYSTIQUE)

CYCLES (excerpt / work-in-progress)

Choreographic research exploring corporeal memory, emotional cycles, and cathartic release through movement

This solo research project explores bodily memory and emotional cycles through the dualities of waacking - a dance form both powerful and vulnerable. Drawing from experiences of irregular menstruation (its rage, shame, and exhaustion), the work transmutes cyclical patterns into cathartic movement where club energy meets vulnerable self-revelation.

Evolving my waacking practice beyond club and battle contexts, I investigate its theatrical potential. This excerpt presents raw material from an ongoing journey toward reconciling with the body's stubborn rhythms.
